There was once a country...I left it as a child, but my memory of it is sunlight clear.

I love my life in London, I love my friends and all the experiences. But it doesn't feel right. It doesn't feel like waking up in Iran to the smell of freshly cooked kebab koobideh and naan bread. Running downstairs to see my Baba reading the stories of Rostam to my brother while my Maman cooks what is bound to be the best food you'll ever eat.

Living in London is a whole different experience. People would never understand we eat brain and tongue sandwiches and call people we love 'liver'. When I get out my feta cheese wraps with mini cucumbers people give me weird looks. If only they gave it a try. What I do love though, is spotting Iranians in public. As soon as I see a woman with dyedblonde hair, a nose job, gold jewellery, designer clothes walking a small white fluffy dog; I look at my mum who's already looking at me and we both say: 'Iranian'.

My journey here from Iran was one that I'll remember forever.

Starting in the dove-white mountains that soared into the sky. Encased in a necklace of white, people skied down through the chill air. I could smell stew being made in a cabin nearby. The next morning, we set off to the capital. Tehran. Excitement was bubbling inside of me as I could see the city centre on the horizon.

It was a city of narrow avenues and small places to sit and eat, to relax as people went about their day. The sun was hidden behind fluffy clouds, radiating its luminescence into the bazaars. The smell of freshly baked naan wafted past my nose, quickly followed by the greasy touch of smoking lamb kebab making me feel slightly queasy in the summer heat. Shops of all different species stood on either side of the road, selling everything from jewellery to food to poetry books. Large, tattered waggons decorated with a collage of fruit and vegetables were parked beside the street and their owners stood beside them screaming prices like auctioneers. Tehran was exactly how I'd imagined it.

After weeks of travelling through the cobbled streets of Iran, we finally reached the tropical countryside. The sand was the gentlest hue of gold; a place where families gathered to say their last goodbyes. Palm trees stood tall along the beach dancing to the breeze from the waters of the seas. I sat on the cloud-like sand as my little brother rested his head on my shoulder. Trying to stop my tears, I thought back to my childhood and how special it was. This journey had taught me the value of lie and leaving this life behind is for the best, right?

My heart beats louder and louder the further we got away from my home country. Silence was the only noise that came.




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
